
#### **Academic**

#### **Accommodation**



For exchange student in UC Davis, we are not allowed to stay in dormitories because it is restricted to all first-year students. We need to find other places to stay. For me, I choose to stay in West Village apartments, which is affiliated with the university. It means that everybody who lives in West Village apartments must be either students or university staffs. Even though the rents are quite expensive compared to other apartments in the area, the apartments provide good environment and a lot of facilities such as swimming pool, gym, study lounges, etc. Moreover, it has a bus that comes every 15 minutes that goes straight from the apartments to the center of campus. It takes only 5 minutes to the campus. Good things about living in this apartment is that it is an individual lease so I do not need to deal with other housemate parts. Furthermore, each of the resident has a key to the main door of the apartment but can only use the key to open their bedroom. It not only facilitates the resident in entering or leaving the apartment but also reduces the chance of robber in the apartment.


#### **Transportation**

In city of Davis, there are buses that goes everywhere in the town. The stations are right inside on the campus. It usually comes every 15 minutes up to 1 hour depends on the line and the day.
